The XIV Convocation of Dibrugarh University was held on 25 March 2014. A total of 15,273 candidates of the University, including Ph.D and M.Phil, were awarded various degrees during the ceremonial convocation by His Excellency, the Governor of Assam and Hon'ble Chancellor of the University Sjt. Janaki Ballav Patnalk. Professor Basudev Chatterji, eminent Historian and the Chairperson of the Indian Council of Historical Research delivered the Convocation Address as the Chief Guest of the occasion. The Degree of D.Litt (honoris causa) was conferred on two distinguished scholars –Professor Mrinal Miri, a noted Scholar of Philosophy and an eminent Academician and Ven. Sasana Bangsha Mahathera, an eminent Philosopher and Scholar of Buddhism. The Hon'ble Vice-Chancellor, Professor Alak K. Buragohain, presented the Welcome Address followed by the Inaugural speech of His Excellency, the Governor of Assam and Hon'ble Chancellor of the University, Sjt. Janaki Ballav Patnaik, who also presided the Convocation. A total of 9,265 certificates were issued in all including 72 for Ph.D and 18 for M.Phil.

A Note from the Vice-Chancellor

By the time this issue of the *DU News Letter* comes out of the press, we will have ushered in the Assamese new year. The pervasive resonance of Rangall Bihu and the soft fragrance of Bohag shall keep us enthralled in the festive season. As we return to work, refreshed and reinvigorated, we begin with new resolutions to elevate our University into even greater heights. While a country as large as ours is engaged in addressing the biggest challenges of equity and access in the field of higher education, we must remain focussed on excellence in education and research as well. In this context, it does augur well for any University to remain in constant intellectual ferment with scholars, scientists and experts from various parts of the country and the world through seminars, conferences and workshops. The last six months have been quite eventful during which the campus had around one thousand and five hundred footfalls in connection with three major conferences. The 8th North East Business Summit, held in November 2013, which the University organised under the aegis of the DoNER Ministry, Government of India and the Indian Chamber of Commerce, gave us an opportunity to showcase our University before a number of foreign delegates from the US, Italy, French, South Korea and the Ministerial delegations from several South East Asian countries including, Myanmar, Thailand, Cambodia, Laos, Indonesia and Brunei. Next, the 18th National Seminar in Space Science (NSSS-2014) of the Indian Space Research Organization (ISRO) was organised by the Centre for Atmospheric Studies in January-February, 2014. This national event which was organised for the second time in the North East after almost 30 years, witnessed participation of about 650 delegates from all over the country including a good number from our own University, besides a few NRI space scientists from abroad. The Indian National Confederation and Academy of Anthropologists (INCAA) organised the Indian Anthropological Congress in collaboration with the Department of Anthropology of this University in February, 2014. Several eminent Anthropologists from within and outside the country participated in the four day Congress.

It is also heartening to take note that most of the academic departments which have been selected by the UGC for the Special Assistance Programme (SAP) at the DRS-I level are doing well and a few of these has been elevated to DRS-II and the Department of Assamese has been elevated to a Centre for Advance Studies. Six out of the Eight Science Departments are selected under the Fund for Improvement of Science and Technology in Higher Education Institutions (FIST) of the Department of Science and Technology, Government of India. The Centre for Biotechnology has been selected as one of the Biotech Hubs by the Department of Biotechnology, Government of India. While these are encouraging signs of academic dynamism, there is much to be done by us in terms of research output. If the number of extramural projects and the project



values is a reflection of the extent of our engagement in committed research activity, then we can make our own assessment from the following data. During 2012-13 the number of funded projects of the faculties of the four Universities of Assam with the project values in INR in the parenthesis are —Gauhati University 56 (Rs.5.06 Crores), Dibrugarh University 30 (Rs.4.49 Crores), Assam University 138 (Rs. 6.45 Crores) and Tezpur University 142 (Rs. 60 Crores). Obviously there is scope for us to do much more.

Academic collaboration with Universities and Institutes of repute is yet another way to infuse the elements of excellence in quality teaching and research. Moves are afoot to transform a few individual level collaborations of some faculty members with one or two Universities abroad to institutional level collaborations. The location of our University in the geostrategically important North East in close proximity to the international borders assumes great significance in the context of forging academic collaborations with several good Universities in the South East Asian countries. It is pertinent to mention that in the aftermath of the 8th North East Business Summit held in the University in November 2013, a Memorandum of Understanding with Kasetsart University, Bangkok, is to be formalised very shortly. It hardly needs to reiterate that presence of international students and faculties in the University adds a different dimension to its intellectual horizon and help build reputation for our University.

A Virtual Class room has been made operational in the University with support from the UGC which will go a long way in extending the reach of our University to the remotest parts of upper Assam.

The University is observing the 150th birth anniversary of *Raxaraj* Lakshminath Bezbaroa in a befitting manner. A comprehensive bibliography of all writings of Bezbaroa has been published by the Publication Division of the University. The monthly colloquium and the Scholar in Residence programme have been regularly held with much enthusiasm and meaningful intellectual fervour.





Periodic academic audit of the courses and programmes offered by the University is essential to maintain the quality of the education, research and the standard of governance. A comprehensive academic audit of the Institute of Engineering and Technology has already been concluded. The academic audit for the other Departments and Centres of Studies shall commence from May, 2014.

The shift to the semester system obviously has the concomitant issues of insufficiency in the number of teachers and infrastructures. The Government's role in creating infrastructure and faculty positions is undoubtedly critical for the success of the semester system. While these are important for effective implementation of the semester system and the consequent enhancement in the quality of education extended to the students, the larger issues relate to a shift in the mindset to develop an organic relationship with the taught. This organic relationship elevates the process of human resource development to a meaningful level. This shift requires efforts creation of awareness amongst all stakeholders of the higher education and strategic approaches. Our University has already initiated moves in this direction involving the Principals of colleges. Organization of an awareness programme on the various aspects of the semester system amongst the office bearers of the College Unions of the affiliated colleges by the Post Graduate Students Union of our University recently is indeed a timely and praiseworthy move.

The Fourteenth Convocation of the University was held on 25th March, 2014. about fifteen thousand students were conferred various degrees in the convocation. The D. Litt., honoris causa was conferred on two eminent scholars- Professor Mrinal Miri, former Vice Chancellor North Eastern Hill University, Shillong, a scholar of Philosophy of international repute and currently an honourable member of the Rajya Sabha; and the venerable Sasana Bangsha Mahathera who is an eminent scholar of Budhhist studies in Pali.

Living up to our social commitment, we have embraced a village in our neighbourhood as an 'Associate Village'. A number of meaningful programmes involving the villagers of this village are being taken up with our research students, faculty members, doctors of the University Health Centre and non-teaching staff.

Thus, we forge ahead with our mission to spread the light of knowledge with conviction, commitment and courage.

Eleventh Indian Anthropological Congress held in DU

The Department of Anthropology, DU organized the 11th Indian Anthropological Congress 2014 in collaboration with Indian National Confederation and Academy of Anthropologists (INCAA) and Indira Gandhi Rashtriya Manav Sangrahalaya (IGRMS), Bhopal at Dibrugarh University during 21–23 February 2014. The focal theme chosen for deliberations during the congress was Human Variation, Plurality and Diversities: Anthropological Perspectives. Prof. M. N. Dutta, Registrar, DU and Chairperson, Organizing Committee of the 11th Indian Anthropological Congress-2014 welcomed the delegates and also stated the significance of the Congress for the anthropology community and anthropology department of Dibrugarh University in particular. Inaugurating the Congress, the Hon'ble Vice Chancellor of Dibrugarh University Prof. Alak Kumar Buragohain expressed the commitments to create facilities at Dibrugarh University so that anthropologists from all over the world could come forward to this part of the country, which sits on a repository of multiple diversities and to explore the unexplored. Renowned Anthropologist, Prof. Ajit Kumar Danda, Member Secretary INCAA spoke at length about INCAA. On this occasion, Prof. A. C. Bhagabati, formerly Vice Chancellor, Arunachal University and presently Vice Chairperson, INCAA released a number of publications brought out by INCAA. Prof. R. K. Mutatkar, formerly of Pune University, and Chairman INCAA presided the inaugural session. The oration in honour of Prof. B.M.Das was delivered by Prof. Ranjan Deka, an alumnus of Dibrugarh University and presently a faculty of Cincinati University on a topic - Mapping Complex Traits in Adriatic Islands: Anthropology Laid the Foundations. Prof. T. N. Madan delivered Prof. S.C. Dube memorial oration on Traditions, Transformations, Transcreations: The Making and Remaking of 'Modern' Hinduism. A Round Table on the theme Unrest, Insurgency and Beyond was also organized which was well attended. About 260 professional anthropologists representing 28 Indian Universities and Research Institutions from all over the country; and six participants from abroad have participated in the scientific deliberations.

Are the western parameters for ascertaining the value, quality and worth of institutes the benchmarks to aspire for by the rest? Conspiracy theories, which could well be facts, would of course run rife whenever such global surveys are conducted under universalising parameters. But, does it necessarily imply foreclosure to all the supposed 'fictions' (which could well be facts) generated by the ideologically-mediated ranking organisations functioning under global capital? The Special Feature tries to underscore some of these pertinent issues objectively (if that is possible). This issue could be termed as a Convocation Special Edition Insofar as the XIV Convocation of Dibrugarh University held on 25 March 2014 turned out to be a resounding success, if one could pass over minor technical glitches which an event of this gargantuan scale may, despite one's best efforts and preparedness, engender. It was a huge confluence of scholars, staff and students across the disciplines, and we have devoted ample space to it, to relieve/re-live the moment. A newsletter tends to be good or bad depending upon the institutes' activities per se. We have had a great deal of activities the past six-months, and we hope that these will get reflected here in the manner it deserves. Otherwise, we would have failed in our task. The varsity is on the threshold of entering into its fiftleth year since its modest inception on 1 July 1965. DU celebrates the 65th Republic Day

The 65th Republic Day was observed with pomp and gaiety at Dibrugarh University. The National flag was hoisted by the Vice Chancellor, Prof. Alak Kr. Buragohain in the University playground. Indian Universities Outranked: Rankings as a Gratuitous Exercise or as Constructive Benchmarks?

Poor performance by Indian Universities in the rankings brought out by organizations like Times Higher Education (THE), Academic Rankings of World Universities (ARWU) of Shanghaj Jiao Tong University (CWCU), and Quacquarelli Symonds (QS) has led to much debate among Indian academicians, policy makers, civil society and media.

In the THE rankings, which ranks 400 institutes, India does not have a single institute among the top 200. Panjab University (PU) has made an impressive debut in the 226-250 bracket, while IIT-Delhi, IIT-Kanpur, IIT-Kharagpur and IIT-Roorkee are in the 351-400 segment. These four IITs and PU are the only five Indian institutes among the 400, ranked by the THE organization. Other Universities which are much-coveted by Indian students like Delhi University. Jawaharlal Nehru University, Pune University, University of Hyderabad, Universities of Bombay and Calcutta are conspicuously absent from the list.

For the second consecutive year, the California Institute of Technology has topped the THE list, followed by Harvard University, which shares second place with the University of Oxford. Stanford University (fourth), Massachusetts Institute of Technology (fifth), Princeton University (sixth), University of Cambridge (seventh), University of California, Berkeley (eighth), University of Chicago (ninth) and Imperial College London (tenth) complete the top 10. The US, with seven institutes in the top 10 and 77 in the top 200, dominates the THE rankings. Japan's University of Tokyo, at 23rd place, is the top Asian

The THE World University Rankings uses 13 separate performance indicators

to examine a University's strengths against all its core missions — teaching, research, knowledge transfer and international outlook. The performance indicators for the THE 2013-2014 World University Rankings were grouped into five areas:

- Teaching: the learning environment (worth 30 per cent of the overall ranking
- Research: volume, income and reputation (worth 30 per cent)
- Citations: research influence (worth 30 per cent)
- Industry income: Innovation (worth 2.5 per cent)
- International outlook: staff, students and research (worth 7.5 per cent).

In the Academic Rankings of World Universities (ARWU), which is conducted by researchers at the Center for World-Class Universities of Shanghal Jiao Tong University (CWCU), the Universities are ranked by several indicators of academic or research performance, including alumni and staff winning Nobel Prize and Fields Medals, highly cited researchers, papers published in journals like Nature and Science, papers indexed in major citation indices, and the per capita academic performance of an institution. For each indicator, the highest scoring institution is assigned a score of 100, and other institutions are calculated as a percentage of the top score. The distribution of data for each indicator is examined for any significant distorting effect; standard statistical techniques are used to adjust the indicator if necessary. Scores for each indicator are weighted as shown below to arrive at a final overall score for an institution. The highest scoring institution is assigned a score of 100, and other institutions are calculated as a percentage of the top score. An institution's rank reflects the number of institutions that sit above it. Indian Institute of Science was the only Indian University ranked in the top 500 by the Academic Ranking of World Universities, at 301-400th place overall in 2013.

First compiled in 2004, the QS World University Rankings currently considers over 2,000 institutions, and ranks over 800. The top 400 are ranked individually, whereas those placed 401 and over are ranked in groups. The top 10 Universities in the QS World University Rankings 2013/2014 are, once again, all in either the US or UK. Around 11 Indian institutes feature in the top 800 of the global list with the highest ranking going to IIT Delhi which is placed 222 in the list. Two other made it to the top 300-IIT Bombay (233) and IIT Kanpur (295), IIT Madras is ranked 313 while IIT Kharagpur stands at 346. The other Indian institutes to make it to the top 800 list Include IIT Rourkee (401), Delhi University (441), JIT Guwahati and Mumbai University both at (601) with University of Pune and Kolkata at 701. The QS World University Rankings are based on four key pillars—research, teaching, employability and internationalization. The methodology consists of six indicators: academic reputation (40%), employer reputation (10%), and faculty student ratio (20%), citations per faculty (20%), international students (5%) and international faculty (5%).

There are several reactions to such rankings and league tables in India. Some criticize such rankings as invalid and unscientific and even as perpetuating some kind of hegemonic control over research and innovation. Others see them as useful benchmarks and yardsticks for Universities across the world to consider while evaluating their merits and weaknesses. Others react with dismay at India's lackluster performance and some attempt to rationalize the reasons behind Indian Universities not making the cut.

There can be several reasons behind India's poor showing in the rankings. First, India's higher education system must cater to the current educational needs of the country. India has many institutions, with hundreds of attached undergraduate colleges that they must manage which diverts them from

pursuing research goals in a more specialized manner. India also has many research-only institutions that have almost no undergraduate or postgraduate teaching – many of these are not included in international University rankings. Secondly, there are several logistical hurdles imposed by governmental restrictions, which prevent Indian Universities from faring better in such rankings. For instance, the IITs are not allowed to admit international students at the BTech level and restrictions on government assistantships dissuade international PhD students. Additionally Indian rules allow institutes like the IITs to hire international faculty only on a contract basis that too only for up to five years, and the salary has to be at least \$25,000 annually. These hurdles or 'higher education protectionism', prevent Indian Universities from competing evenly as far as the criteria of 'internationalization of campuses' is concerned which is an important parameter for the ranking agencies.

Thirdly, there are several methodological issues which hinder India's chances of performing better in the rankings. For instance, 33 percent of the weightage is based on 'reputation' in the *THE* rankings. Organizations like *THE* approach Universities to advertise in their guides, attend their seminars, participate in their conferences, in other words are aggressively marketing their products through which institutions can enhance their 'reputation' and thereby gain a higher rank as far as this parameter is concerned. Indian Universities, if the rankings are any indicator, have not adequately accepted these overtures of the ranking organizations and thus the poor performance in yet another indicator. Moreover, 'reputation' is based on the opinion of some academics chosen from different parts of the world. This has been seen as an unscientific basis for any study as academics in one part of the world, despite forces of globalization, cannot be aware of the state of Universities in every other part of the globe.





Fourthly, the manner in which 'citations' are used as a basis for the rankings has been viewed as skewed in favour of a few Universities which have international collaborations. For instance, Panjab University's high rank in the citations parameter was greatly helped by the fact that its high energy physics group is part of global experiments at CERN and Fermi Labs, and papers from that project have very high citations, thus the high score.

In addition, it has been stated that such ranking agencies give more importance to certain kinds of research — the research that appears in 'recognised' international refereed journals, most of which are in English which limits the scope for academics who publish in other languages. Publication in 'high Impact factor journals' is considered Important, but most of these journals remain bastions of the Western world, demanding a uniformity in research styles and forms, which leads to a perpetuation of existing systems of 'legitimate' research. However, there are several opinions in India which while agreeing that such rankings are not a comprehensive arbiter or the final say on quality, insist that they need to be considered by India as they provide an insight into what counts as valuable and good across the world. It is pertinent that Indian Universities take note of the consensus on benchmarks. These rankings also put into perspectives the many facunae in India's higher education system.

Indian Universities are in short supply given the fact that more than 50% of Indians are below the age of 25 which implies that most of India is at the college-University going age or will soon be at that age. Every year some institutes like Delhi University sees astronomical increase in the number of applicants and thus the unfathomable rise in the cut-off marks (sometimes even at 100%) for admission into courses in its colleges. However, is this demand by students a sign of the health of the institutes in question? Or is securing a seat even in the most-coveted Indian institute not enough according to global standards? There are serious reservations emanating from several quarters in India about the incompetence of Indian Universities, even those which are supposedly 'in-demand' inside India but cannot compete globally on any recognizable parameter.

Several issues have been identified as underlying India's inability to compete globally. Teaching as a career is not attractive for Indians which leads to an inadequate number of well-qualified, competent and committed teachers. Although India expanded the higher education sector in terms of enrollment, number of institutions and number of Universities but quality of infrastructure, faculty, learning and research environment did not simultaneously improve. The poor showing of Indian Universities in the global rankings is also an indicator of the fact that most Indian higher education institutes continue to focus on teaching rather than on research.

Several opinions in India agree about the need to support education reforms and improve research standards in Indian Universities. It is undoubted that greater government expenditure should be channeled into the education sector, however, institutes which are responsible for the state of higher education in India like the MHRD, UGC must insist on accreditation being strong, meaningful and the basis of funding and or approvals. Releasing monetary grants by institutions like the ICSSR, UGC for hosting seminars and conferences to colleges and Universities should be followed by reports submission on the innovations and advances in research which occurred in the events, and these reports should form the basis for the next release of funds.

In a race to fulfill the requirements needed under the assured *Career Advancement Scheme (CAS)* most faculties in Indian Universities are engaged in a frenzy to publish papers and attend seminars, with little time and effort available for investing in attaining eminence in specific research areas. CAS ensures a sense of false security for those in the teaching profession without demanding quality research work from them in return.






India's higher education sector can be greatly benefited by the involvement of Indian diaspora especially those who are working in institutes abroad. Moreover, removing logistical barriers which prevent foreign students and faculties from becoming part of Indian institutes will help India boost its score in the rankings and will also lead to exchange of ideas, views, and study methods thereby broadening the academic horizons of students in the Indian higher education institutes.

Global rankings of Universities based on studies conducted by one organization or the other obviously cannot be the absolute truth of the standard of an institute or the health of higher education in a nation. However, rankings do provide benchmarks and can be held as yardsticks to introspect about the nature of higher education being provided in a nation. Every country needs to be mindful of its traditions and local context while setting the rules for higher education in its institutions and India is no different. The rankings provide an opportunity to all stakeholders to assess the current higher education system, make the required adjustments and mould a system whereby the institutes are not simply designed in a manner that pleases such ranking organizations but helps Universities provide meaningful education where both learning and research are concerned.




Colloquium Deliberations

Noted *Professor of Eminence* Delivers a Talk on Human Origins and Diversities

The Third DU Colloquium was organized on 20 December 2013. The guest speaker of the colloquium was Prof. Muhammad Abdul Kalam, Professor of

Eminence, Department of Sociology, Tezpur University. He delivered a talk on Human Origins and Diversities: Physical and Socio-Cultural Facets. Prof. Abdul Kalam was the former Chairperson (Dean) in the School of Social Sciences, University Madras, and has held numerous positions in different educational administrative institutes and organizations. His areas of interest include migration, identity politics and ethnicity. Prof. Sarthak Sengupta, the Head, Department of Anthropology, Dibrugarh University delivered the



welcome note. Prof. Kalam's lecture emphasized the importance of understanding the socio-cultural aspect of human evolution and he presented a brief history of the evolution of humans and migration. He elaborated on the interrelationships between the development of technology and social organization of human societies. Stressing on the necessity to understand and respect the diverse socio-cultural practices of different groups of people, Prof. Kałam enriched the talk by giving pertinent anecdotes from everyday lives of the people. The talk was followed by an interactive session between the speaker and scholars, which was moderated by Prof. Nitul Gogoi. Relevant discussion on the concepts of evolution and its socio-cultural dimension came up during the session.

Prof. R K Dev Goswami Delivers a Talk on Bezbaroa and Assamese Culture

The Fourth DU Colloquium organized was held on 7 February 2014. The guest speaker of the Colloquium was Professor Ranjit Kr. Dev Goswami, Professor of English, Gauhati University, and an eminent scholar of Vaishnavite Studies who delivered his talk on Bezbaroa aru Asomiya Sanskriti. The welcome address was delivered by Professor D. Nath of the Department of History, DU. Prof. Dev Goswami observed that the ideology of Assamese culture is closely associated with Lakshminath Bezbaroa. He stressed that Bezbaroa welcomed democratic values to Assamese culture and language. He embellished the Assamese language and culture in a new way. He also followed the path shown by harbingers like Ananda Ram Dhekial Phukan, Hem Chandra Barua, Gunabhiram Barua etc. to enlighten the Assamese mind and society. Annada Shankar Roy considered Bezbaroa to be one of the great intellectuals of the







third generation during the time of the Indian renaissance. Bezbaroa propagated equality of woman and eradication of the caste system in the Assamese community and society. He also gave the Assamese language a distinct form and identity, and he brought an end to the linguistic differences between the languages of upper and lower Assam.

Eminent Scientist Prof. Samir Bhattacharya delivers a talk on Religion and Science

Prof. Samir Bhattacharya, Senior Scientist, National Academy of Sciences, India (NASI), and Professor Emeritus, Department of Zoology, School of Life Sciences, Visva Bharati, delivered the Fifth DU Colloquium talk on the topic Religion and Science on 3 March 2014 In DU. The welcome address was presented by Prof. D.S. Borah, the Head of the Department of Life Sciences. In his lecture Prof. Bhattacharyya argued that both religion and science have commonalities; both search the truth, both desire to find the suitable way to avail the truth and both create followers who could make advancement in this search. He stated that a seeker of spirituality might not like science but that should not influence him to denigrate It; similarly in the case of a scientist, who might not accept the existence of God, it is not fair for him to provoke non-existence of God because he or she never attempted to seek this knowledge. He referred to the lives of many great scientists like Galileo, Darwin and Albert Einstein who firmly believed in the idea that the realms of religion and science are clearly marked off from each other, nevertheless there existed between the two strong reciprocal relationships and dependencies. Prof. Bhattacharya advocated that the main source of the present-day conflicts between the spheres of religion and of science lies in this concept of a personal God. There are many religions and their path to reach the ultimate reality is

different although the destination is the same. In science, the proof of the truth has to be verified by means of experimentation. To embrace both science and spirituality as dependable systems for understanding the process and meaning of life, the first requirement is a broad mindset with wider vision. He also observed that both science and



religion should strive to achieve the highest form of freedom for mankind and to create a kind of society which is free from all forms of artificial barriers of caste and sects and recognize the common bond of brotherhood for the sake

of peace for humanity. He concluded his lecture with a phrase from Albert Einstein-"science without religion is lame, religion without science is blind" which suggested the idea that for the comprehensive growth and development of the society it must be firmly established on the principle of spiritual soul force and scientific empirical doctrines.

Dr. Aravind Yelery Speaks on Chinese Style of Federalism

Dr Aravind Yelery, Senior Fellow, Institute of Chinese Studies, New Delhi spoke on the topic *Indian Perspective over Chinese Style of Federalism: Centre-Province Relationship* in the *Sixth DU Colloquium* on 28 March 2014. Dr Yelery shared his expertise on Chinese studies with the audience. Dr Yelery's oration was highly informative and cerebral in nature. The talk traversed historical, political, cultural, economic and social milieu; providing the audience



with invaluable insights on the state of Centre-Province Relationship in China. Dr Yelery provided a historical insight into the dynamics of federalism in China with references drawn from the erstwhile empires in China to Mao

Zedong, Deng Xiaoping and more contemporary leaders. Comparisons between the federal systems in Russia, India and China were drawn, in order to highlight the unique nature of federalism extant in China. Dr Yelery identified seismic transitions in the social, political, economic, military and external policy avenues, all of which contributed comprehensively to the evolution of federalism in China. The influential role of the provinces in China was highlighted by the speaker, with a view to underline the fact that despite a powerful centre, regionalism was strong in the country. Among other issues, Dr Yelery emphasized the worship of privatization in communist China and the proliferation of shadow banking. Dr Yelery concluded his deliberation by stressing that the system of federalism in China, albeit its unique style, was sound and that it would be further streamlined in the near future. The talk was followed by a lively interaction period where the speaker answered several questions posed by the audience.

Prof. Alak K Buragohain on the Contemporary Value of Indigenous Knowledge System at DURSA Meet




Dibrugarh University Vice Chancellor Professor Alak Kumar Buragohain, who is engaged in research in the field of Drug Discovery from Medicinal Plants, delivered the keynote speech on Indigenous Knowledge System: Is it Relevant Today? in a talk organized by the Research Scholars' Association, Dibrugarh University on 9 December

2013. Highlighting the traditional knowledge system regarding drugs, he said that plants are the sources of many drugs. He also talked about the relevance of Ayurveda in contemporary medicinal science. According to him, the survival instinct of man basically drove the human race to discover certain things which became landmarks in the course of time. Agriculture is one of the first and foremost practices of that sort which transformed the human civilization. He further said that the material things which are nowadays mostly the outcome of science and technology at times overpower the traditional cultural values. This also makes the present day society to look down upon the cumulative knowledge of thousands of years prevailing in a particular culture. If the people give up the traditional practices, one day they will be turned into cultural refugees in the modern world. He insisted on finding out scientific meaning hidden in some good cultural practices in the local societies by the researchers and students of the university. "We should not be carried away from the thousand years' of collective knowledge by the tide of so called modern knowledge of science and technology. In fact we should find out the utilitarian aspect of the traditional knowledge in the modern times", he added. The lecture was followed by interaction between the Vice Chancellor and the faculty members, research scholars and the students of the university.

Renowned Environmentalist Dr. Vandana Shiva at DU Busts Neoliberal Myths on Monoculture, Green Revolution, and Genetic Engineering

The Department of Political Science, Dibrugarh University in collaboration with Action Aid India (NERO) and People's Right Forum, Assam organised a program comprising of a lecture each by Dr. Vandana Shiva and Dr. Mira Shiva in the New Conference Hall of Dibrugarh University on 11 November 2013. Dr. Alpana Borgohain, Head of the Department of Political Science delivered the welcome address and introduced both the speakers. Dr. Vandana Shiva, the author of many books and world renowned eco-feminist and environmentalist, spoke on the topic – *Challenges to Sustainable Farming from Globalisation and Climate Change*. Her lecture revolved around the pertinent issues of loss of biodiversity in the country and the world. She began her discussion by raising her concern towards the loss of diversity of Indian fruits and seeds. The tragedies of Punjab and Bhopal were instrumental in moulding her interest in agricultural issues. She observed that the concept of monoculture in crop

patterns has led to several problems in the world today, and the non-sustainability of Green Revolution has also been proven. It has adversely affected water availability as well as soil and health, and unleashed a vicious circle where the cost of production became higher than the earnings of the farmers which, in turn, had an impact on Minimum Selling Price. The system of procurement from farmers ran into problems and we now face a situation where 17 million tonnes of grains rot while malnutrition and hunger claim the lives of many. Dr. Vandana Shiva called this the 'clogged artery of the Food Distribution System'. She expressed that some highly dishonest activity had created an agrarian crisis in India. One of these was the impact of monopoly created by the Intellectual Property Rights (IPR) regime. Dr Shiva targeted her ire against the multinational firm Monsanto, which indulged in bio-piracy when it took seeds and put toxic genes in it. Genetic engineering, she claimed, had infiltrated the system with widespread adversarial ramifications. Corporations had the power to silence research which prevented the masses from learning about the reality of consuming genetically engineered products. She further claimed that the trading mechanism was under pressure from agents seeking to impose patenting on seeds, which was originally not allowed under Indian Law. Additionally, agents were attempting to break quantitative regulations



thereby disrupting a series of related produces and processes. Moreover, she indicated that there was an effort to criminalise diversity by imposing fines on farmers who strayed from uniformity in food, which benefitted the large global conglomerates alone. Dr. Vandana Shiva stressed that her work was part of a mission to defend people's rights and a pro-earth movement. She concluded by urging the citizens of Assam to preserve their precious resources, freedom and democracy and defend these by way of facts and independent knowledge.

Dr. Mira Shiva, an internationally acclaimed public health activist, spoke on the topic *Genetically Modified (GM) Food and Health Concerns.* She began by stating facts about the pitiable health conditions prevailing in India. In India, 46-48% children under 5 years of age are malnourished and 36.6% women have BMI less than 18.5%. This is leading to the situation where neo-natal deaths are perpetually on the rise. Dr. Mira Shiva expressed that the IPR regime has been instituted to protect big companies and was not promoting public health. Several big Indian companies have had mergers and





acquisitions by foreign companies which bode ill for the access to food and medicine for the masses. These mergers and acquisitions and patenting had led to a rise in prices of drugs. The TRIPS and FTAs being signed by countries like India with the European Union and other actors have frightening clauses in them which favour big business at the cost of the health care access of the general public. Dr. Mira Shiva elaborated on the BT brinjal phenomena and stated that tampering with seeds lead to genetic pollution and contamination which can result in serious public health implications. She also commented on the link between pricing control and the patent process. The destruction of diversity of seeds and foods has led to an increase of diseases like diabetes among the population of the country. She ended her talk by showing the audience some ways in which adulterated food and junk food have infiltrated our minds and systems and stressed the need to perverse traditional skills and knowledge of the peoples in the face of the challenge of corporations and patents regime.

The Vice-Chancellor of DU, Dr. Alak Kumar Buragohain, who is also a biologist, with keen interest in the issue of genetically engineered products, stressed on the grave implications of corporatisation of our food and culture at the cost of our invaluable traditional knowledge on bio-diversity expressed his views on the Global conspiracy which preys on the gullible. This was followed by a lively interaction. The Vote Of Thanks was delivered by Amrita Pritam Gogoi, Assistant Professor, Department of Political Science. The program was resounding success and was attended by over 180 people ranging from civil society members to media persons to teaching and administrative staff of Dibrugarh University and students from several departments.

Eighteenth National Space Science Symposium held in DU

The 18th National Space Science Symposium was held in DU from 29 January to 1 February 2014. The principal objective of the symposium, sponsored by ISRO, In association with the Astronomical Society of India, was to provide a



scientific forum for the Indian space scientist to present new results in atmospheric science, space science, planetary exploration and astronomy and astrophysics. It also enabled discussion on space and ground based astronomy programmes and projects being pursued at various research laboratories, institutes and Universities in India. Five parallel sessions were conducted in areas relevant to Space Science and Astronomy during the symposium attended by three hundred sixteen participants from across the country. The symposium was inaugurated by the renowned scientist Sri A.S. Kiran Kumar, Padmasree, Director, Space Application Centre, Ahmedabad. Prof. A. K. Kembhavi, Director, Inter University Centre for Astronomy and Astrophysics, Pune inaugurated the volume of abstracts and Prof. J. N. Goswami, Director, Physical Research Laboratory; Ahmedabad inaugurated

the ISRO exhibition held simultaneously with the symposium. Vice-Chancellor Prof. A.K. Buragohain presided over the well-attended inaugural function. Prof. J. N. Goswami delivered a popular lecture on the Origin of the Solar System. Twelve distinguished scientists delivered plenary and interdisciplinary lectures on the occasion of the symposium. The Vice-Chancellor, Prof. A. K. Buragohain also participated in the panel discussion on the concluding day and gave away the awards to the best oral and poster presentations.

Eleventh Indian Anthropological Congress 2014 Observed

The Department of Anthropology, DU organized the 11th Indian Anthropological Congress 2014 in collaboration with Indian National Confederation and Academy of Anthropologists (INCAA) and Indira Gandhi Rashtriya Manav Sangrahalaya (IGRMS), Bhopal at Dibrugarh University during 21–23 February 2014. The focal theme chosen for deliberations during the congress was Human Variation, Plurality and Diversities: Anthropological Perspectives. Prof. M. N. Dutta, Registrar, DU and Chairperson, Organizing Committee of the 11th Indian Anthropological Congress 2014 welcomed the delegates and



also stated the significance of the Congress for the anthropology community and anthropology department of Dibrugarh University in particular. Inaugurating the Congress, the Vice-Chancellor of Dibrugarh University Prof. Alak Kumar Buragohain expressed the commitments to create facilities at Dibrugarh University so that anthropologists from all over the world could come forward to this part of the country, which sits on a repository of multiple diversities and to explore the unexplored terrain. The welcome address was presented by Prof. P. Bezborah of the Dept. of Commerce who was also the coordinator of the IAI Week. The Vice-Chancellor Prof. Alak Kr Buragohain in his inaugural speech emphasized on industry academia relationship from an historical perspective. In his views higher educational institutions need to transform themselves and focus on sustained academic growth. At times, it has been observed that the students in the higher educational institutions found themselves unprepared for the industry and on the other hand large numbers of jobs in industries are also found to be lying vacant. He put emphasis on building a constant industry academia relationship

and believed that this is the only way to bridge the gap.

The panel discussion after the inaugural session was conducted by Mr. V.K. Verma, General Manager T&D, Oil India Limited, Duliajan; Mr. R. Kallta, DGM (HR), IOCL (AOD);, Digboi; and Mr. P.K. Mati, DGM (HR), BCPL, Dibrugarh and the session were moderated by Prof. Ajanta B. Rajkonwar of Department of Commerce, DU. The topic of the discussion was *Employability of University Graduates: An Industry Perspective*. The discussion started with sharing of experiences on the topic by Mr. V.K. Varma. In his words, innovative quality, right attitude, knowledge, matured thinking are the criteria they are looking forward for in prospective recruits. He emphasised that industry needs



competent personnel. In his words, academic institutions should conduct programmes for visiting industries with students so as to give them practical exposure. Mr. Mati in his speech remarked that academic institutions are still following traditional educational processes which has augmented the problem of multiple unemployment, so curriculum of the academic Institutions need to be developed based on industry requirement. He also put emphasis on practical knowledge, along with vision and skill development programme. Mr. R. Kalita focussed upon practical approaches to education. In his words, 60% of the graduates do not get recruited because of lack of English communication skills. He also pointed out that shortage of skilled teachers in the educational institutions has compounds the problem. During the session several queries were made by participants to the panel that were addressed to their satisfaction. In the concluding remark, the moderator Prof. A. Rajkonwar has pointed out that academic institutions look forward to industries to build a tie-up and share their database so as to develop the requisite manpower in the academic institutions for the industries.

Academic Audit of DUIET

Under the initiative of the Vice-Chancellor, DU, Prof. A.K. Buragohain, an Academic Audit was conducted during 12-14 February 2014, in DUIET under the supervision of the eminent scientist, Dr. P.G. 
Department of Commerce

Audio and Video Production

A Vocational Training Programme (Skill Development) on Audio and Video Production was organized by the Directorate of Distance Education (DDE), Dibrugarh University, from the 12 - 22 February 2014. This 11-day training programme was sponsored by the Distance Education Bureau (DE8), UGC, New Delhi. The training programme had thirty-five participants, from different educational and social backgrounds. Of them, 10 had Higher Secondary, 14







had BA, and 11 had MA as their highest qualification. Almost all of them were from the surrounding villages and towns of Dibrugarh University. To guide and train these participants there were eleven Resource Persons, having expertise in the field of audio production, video and film



making. This programme was well-structured and it covered both theoretical and practical components involved in Audio-Video Production. There were 38 theory sessions and 14 practical sessions. The particle pants were divided into six groups during the training programme and were asked to prepare a project -a short video/film of maximum 10 minutes. On the last day, a session was devoted to presentations of the aforesaid projects, which were judged by a panel of three invited judges.

Script Writing, Anchoring and News Reading in Radio and Television

Prof. Utpal Sarmah, Department of Computer Science, Tezpur University delivered the first plenary talk on CBCS and the Larger Context wherein he stated the dividends and pitfalls of the CBCS and provided suggestions, followed by an interaction. A panel discussion on Reflection on Experiences of CBCS and Semester System in Dibrugarh University, followed. On the second day Prof. M. Hazarika, Dept. of Education, DU, delivered the speech on Modes of Pedagogy in Tertiary Level. Prof. Jogen Kalita, Gauhati University, delivered the plenary speech on Measures Relating to Systemic Corrections in CBCS,. The workshop ended with the Roadmap Session chaired by Prof. J.G. Handique. The experts concurred at the end of the workshop that the CBCS system was lacking on several fronts. For instance, the evaluation mechanism of the students require reviewing; the curriculum development needs to be a continuous process; inquiry-oriented syllabi blended with skill-based and vocation electives is necessary; interdisciplinary elective needs to be provided to make the CBCS effective, among others.


institutional mechanism for capacity building and implementation of inclusive policies based on group work.

The Chief Guest Emphasizes on Inclusion of Humanities as a Core Discipline

Prof. Basudev Chatterji, the Chairperson of the Indian Council for Historical Research., shared his 'thoughts on education, and in particular on Universities'. Prof. Chatterji began by expressing that 'historically, education, and especially Universities, have played a central transformatory role' and that 'Universities have been the custodians of the intellectual capital of the world and promoters of culture and specialized knowledge'. With regard to the school system, Prof. Chatterji opined that in 'India where material, social and cultural endowments are so unevenly distributed, our school system needs to make massive advances not only in terms of numbers but in terms of quality'. The speaker stressed the indispensability of a 'good system of school education' as 'schools are, after all, where children are trained in the joy and pleasure of learning. It is here that the best from the wealth of tradition is transferred from one generation to another, and is continually renewed'. It was expressed that 'the most fundamental principle is not to clutter the mind of young children with too much information and too many disparate ideas' and that 'from the start,

schools should build
upon the natural (Einstein calls it 'divine')
curiosity with which children are endowed'.
On the question of the medium of instruction,
Prof. Chatterji stated that 'undoubtedly primary

education is best imparted through the mother-tongue'

and that 'after class V, children can be introduced to at least two other useful languages'. The speaker the desirability of a multi-lingual school system, as it "resists the tyranny of linguistic majorytarianism which only generates the highly flawed idea of 'identity politics'; it promotes social inclusiveness; it equalizes opportunity for social mobility; it helps geographical mobility; it enables interaction with a larger community; and it opens up ever widening horizons of learning". Regarding senior school, Prof. Chatterji stressed that 'humanities' must be an integral part of the curriculum as it provides young students understanding of the human condition which is useful for living an examined life but it was also stressed that 'for any of these to be achieved, dedicated teachers who are artist in nurturing young minds, derive pleasure from it and are passionate about it are required in increasingly large numbers and need to be continuously replenished. They have to teach through imaginative methods including a judicious mix of modern technologies and manual skills'. Speaking on the function of Colleges and Universities, Prof. Chatterji expressed that 'Universities have trained the pioneers of human civilizations and 'they are meant to be institutions of knowledge and higher research'. Commenting on the vital importance of a sound University system, the speaker remarked that 'universities are also the place where the youth enter an active phase of self development' and students are required to be 'given some leisure, freedom to think fearlessly and to interact with other minds in the University with a culture of argument and dissent' and it is most important that students "should not be over burdened with too many subjects (point





system) which leads to 'superficiality'". It was also noted that 'the quality of the faculty of colleges and Universities is central to their effective functioning who have to 'execute the task of education and research'; and ensure ample 'contact and conversation with the young students' which is 'vital for imaginative teaching and research'.

The speaker traced a brief history of the Indian University system and highlighted that in India "modern' universities were unencumbered by any ancient or medieval religious baggage as was the case in Europe" but by the 'middle nineteenth century, institutions of higher learning everywhere were meant for the select few, not the masses and this remained the case until well into the early decades of the twentieth century' and thus 'universities remained the preserve of the privileged classes'. It was noted that the situation improved in free India when 'the ideals of equality and social inclusiveness became a major impulse behind the expansion of universities' and 'there followed steady expansion of higher education all across the country while existing universities

and colleges expanded with more students and more teachers. The benefit was most apparent in the case of women'. The hand of the government and socio-polítical movements in accommodating disadvantaged castes in higher education was lamented upon by the speaker especially its unconstructive consequences for maintaining academic standards'.


The speaker made some astute observations on certain other aspects of Indian Universities. It was noted that today impulse for 'expert knowledge' is driven by the global market forces making us acquisitive and greedy consumerists to the neglect of higher human values".

The speaker observed that "neglect of the 'humanities' - history, literature, philosophy - is rampant" which meant that the 'social values of peace, compassion and tolerance have been pushed to the background, leading to a loss of humanity. It was opined that the 'Humanities' prepares the 'youth for understanding life in his manifold form which await them in the future' and 'helps in understanding with sympathy the ups and downs of life, feelings, sentiments, and desires of fellow individuals'. The humanities help students "preserve the dignity of their individual selves in our alienating 'modem' world" and helps "to create the 'citizens' of the country whose 'ability to think independently and reasonably and guided by their conscience alone can quarantee the protection and improvement of our democracy". The bureaucratized nature of management of institutions of higher learning was commented upon, with an emphasis on the intrusion of the UGC into the

autonomy of the Universities, a body which was originally created to uphold the autonomy and standard of institutions. It was also observed that 'there is too much pressure on the faculty to publish' which was redundant as 'the output of a University cannot be solely measured by the number of articles and books published by the teachers' and it has only led to the 'multiplication of journals' and publishers of dubious credentials'. The lack of 'space for regular interaction amongst the university fratemity - a space for thinking aloud in conversation' was also lamented upon.

Finally, the speaker closed by making the following observations -'Our Universities should open its gates to individuals...from every part of the world living and working together with individuals of different regions and nationalities helps mutual understanding and strengthens the idea of global communities. Local and regional and narrow, exclusivist community passions cannot allowed be to over ride the crying need for openness to the world; we do a disservice to humanity if we 'fragment' the world with 'narrow domestic walls'. Every


> university needs to open its doors and windows to the world and thereby find its place in the
